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The atmosphere of his home made him a politician; Gibbon andMill's Political Economy shaped his mind; strong Church of Ireland were his convictions; residence in Russia showed Parliament as the way. By a miracle he defeated Will Crooks in Jan. 1910. It cost £1,500 and £200 a year. Balfour was his living ideal; Pitt and Lincoln in the past. The Army estimates (June 1910) provided his best speech; one by Lord Salisbury at the Albert Hall, the best he heard; and he loved to catch an opponent tripping. His best work was getting a murderer (late Sergeant R.A.) released, and paying his passage to his friends in Canada. He was beaten in Dec. 1910 "by a Government publication which deprived me of my profession and of all further activity - an infringement of every Member's constitutional right to free speech in Parliament."

He was on active service again 1914-17. He was a brilliant linguist, wrote many books including poetry; and his statement of his case may be found in "Whither? or The British Dreyfus Case," 1920.
